"I am writing to give you an overview of the 2018-2019 Academic Year. A year that started well and which did not produce any major upsets.

A year in which all eyes were on us to see what the end-of-year results would be. In preparation for all of this, we took the steps that I hope will bring success.

First of all, as you know, new foreign teachers (2 from Togo, one Muslim and one Christian, and one from Benin, also a Christian) were recruited to replace teachers who were unable to deliver the results we expected. They are young, dynamic and hardworking. We hope this will transform our misfortune from last year into a beautiful harvest. Immediately af-

> terwards, additional textbooks and year books were made available to candidates in both grades. During the first quarter and beginning of the second quarter, we also organised supervised homework every Sunday. At the beginning of the 2nd quarter, we replaced these weekly homework sessions with a series of

### Primary School: an excellent report for the 2018- 2019 school

"The 2018-2019 school year at TANAT Private School ends on an overall note of satisfaction. Today it closes its doors with a complement of 179 students, including 80 girls. The formal education programme as planned was implemented 100%, without exception, in all classes. During the year assessments were carried out. These helped to identify pupils with learning difficulties. For

pupils with learning difficulties. For those students, remedial sessions were organised by their teachers over the weekends.

This tutoring programme has helped to improve the academic level of the students and it achieved a commendable number of passes during the last assessment that was held from May 20 to 24, 2018. The overall results of that assessment are:

172 pupils go up to the next class,

block assignments where we took a week to do homework, in all subjects.

We took this decision because many teachers found that, firstly, the correction and return of the homework took time and interfered with their ability to complete the programmes on time; secondly; they also found that the students focused only on the subject matter contained in the assignment for that week so that if, by chance, a teacher arranged a surprise quiz, the marks were not good.

In the first quarter we saw a marked improvement in the level of achievement of the students. But this was not the case for the second quarter. As a result, management decided that additional lessons should be held in Arabic, Maths and Philo for Terminal A; Maths, PC and SVT for Terminal D; English, French and Maths for Grade 3.

Another innovation to boost student work has been the introduction of three reports during the year instead of the two official half-yearly ones. This is all designed to get our learners to work harder. "A Hassane Moumouni, proviseur de l'établissement secondaire TANAT

*i.e.* 96%, and 7 must repeat, 2 of which are girls. Most repeat students have difficulties especially in reading, which is a prerequisite for acquiring knowledge in any school subject. As part of the effort to improve teaching practice, inspections were carried out by the School Director, the Inspector of the IEP of Abalak as well as Educational advisers.

In the same vein, two of our teachers benefited from educational interactions with the administration and teachers from the Institut Bayard and Philippine Duchesne ITEC Boisfleury in Grenoble from 8 to 12 April 2019. These exchanges enabled them to improve their teaching practices.

Next year, the school will open a mid-level Nursery School / Kindergarten class. A new building has already been built, it consists of a classroom and another room for rest periods. This Nursery School will allow us to better prepare our youngsters for the Upper Nursery School phase, known as the Initiation Class (CI) in Niger."

"In Abalak, heat remains the top story This heat is accompanied by problems with water. Indeed, Abalak has experienced a shortage of water that has spared no neighbourhood in this city. This cutting of water is linked to the poor state of the installations which are ageing and oversensitive to heat. This is a daily problem in Abalak. Every year, as soon as the hot season sets in, water becomes a rare commodity.

Only neighbourhoods in the lowlands have water. This automatically causes a rush to those neighbourhoods and anxiety and fear sets in. '
