Secondary School: Exam Ready

Dear godparents,

Please receive our respectful greetings and deep gratitude for the continued attention, the moral and material support you give to the students of our school. Your commitment to them is a source of inspiration and motivation for the entire educational community.

In order to closely monitor the evolution of the standard of our learners, several continuous evaluations were carried out. The grades achieved show encouraging progress, especially among those students who benefitted from close monitoring.

A regional mock exam, covering the BEPC and BAC programmes, was held from May 12th to 14th 2025, under conditions as close as possible to the official exam. The papers were corrected by a joint board in order to guarantee objectivity and coherence. This exercise allowed students to identify their strengths and weaknesses, and teachers to adjust their teaching strategies before the final deadline.

Given the efforts made by the students, the dedication of the teaching team, the logistical support of the administration and your invaluable support, we are optimistic about the end of year results.

We are aiming for BEPC and BAC success rates similar to previous years. The official results will be communicated to you as soon as they are published by the relevant authorities.

Primary School: another good school year

TANAT Primary School has a student complement of 231, including 106 girls. This number has not undergone any significant change since the start of the school year. The goal of gender parity, however, remains a challenge.

No major disruptions occurred during this school year. and the current curriculum was fully implemented in all the classes. All this was possible thanks to the devotion of the teaching staff, as well as the management and other educators such as the inspector and advisors.

Tutoring sessions were organised for students Fabrice Ogatchin, High School Teacher experiencing difficulty. This support is provided every Saturday. In addition to this activity, there are mini-CAPEDs (Pedagogical Animation Units) during which educational exchanges between the teaching team are held on a very specific theme, often proposed by the director, based on his observation in the classes during supervision. This allowed the teachers to perform well in their respective classes.

It should also be noted that the municipality, under the direction of the new Managing Director, whose portfolio includes the well-being of children

(sanitation in schools), has already sent his team three times to ensure that the toilets and classrooms are clean.

Tea, the delicacy of the Tuaregs

Tea is the only delicacy of the Tuaregs which they drink very hot and sweet.

Introduced by Arab merchants as early as the 18th century, tea was initially a luxury reserved for chiefs, later becoming popular in all Tuareg campments.

The most popular tea is a high-quality green tea from China called "arageyga" and of course the most expensive with its whole leaves.

The preparation of tea follows a real ritual and its tasting is one of the best moments of the day. The first gesture of hospitality is always to offer tea to visitors.

The necessary utensils are: a small enamelled iron teapot, the wire ember holder which is light to carry, small fluted glasses, the sugar hammer often replaced by a crushing device to break the conical sugar loaf and finally the "achaï" tea.

During the tea ceremony, the equivalent of a small tea glass filled to the brim is first poured into the teapot and the leaves are scalded. This water is then thrown away and the tea is infused, shards of sugar loaf are added and the tea is transferred between the teapot and a glass to melt the sugar.

The first tea is very bitter and hot. It is poured very high above the glasses to aerate it and make it froth. This slow ritual will be repeated

several times before drinking it. Then water is added to infuse the tea a second time and serve a second tea and then a third time. The tea is becoming clearer and clearer because the same leaves are used until the end. It is said that:



The first tea is as bitter as death.

The second tea is as sweet as life. The third tea is as sweet as love.

"This beverage haunts the imagination of nomads. Neighbours come to ask for it for the sole purpose of being delivered from a horrible headache that only the arageyga can cure. Everyone among the Tuaregs knows that the lack of tea causes a specific disease, the aneghu, which results in various pain, in addition to discoloration of the skin."

TANAT School

Given the state of the education system in the Abalak region of Niger, residents banded together in 2008, within the ONODEP association chaired by Mayor Billou Mohamed Moctar, to create and run a school that would cater for pupils from nursery school to final year graduation, in partnership with the French TANAT association.
